

Nursery Study of Hibernation







IB LEARNER PROFILE TRAITS





As an International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program (IB PYP) we design and encourage opportunities for our students to use their natural curiosity to lead their learning. Our Nursery students spent time learning about animals that hibernate during our Hibernation and Migration Unit. They learned about what hibernation means, what animals hibernate and how they prepare for hibernation. We spent time exploring what an animal's winter den may look like and then practiced making our own winter dens using toothpicks, cotton balls, and play-doh!

This hands-on exploration fosters their inquiring minds, and truly helps them think creatively. One of the foundations of the IB PYP Program is students developing Learner Profile Traits, this unit of study primarily fosters their **thinker** and **inquirer** traits.



Think Like a Scientist



IB LEARNER PROFILE TRAITS





The First Grade science curriculum builds on this intuitive exploration of the natural world while introducing more formalized experimentation and opportunities for hands-on study. Students are challenged to "think like a scientist" as they embark on experiments to help them learn about the natural world. Science instruction involves learning about the design process, including making and testing of hypotheses, and drawing of logical and scientific conclusions.

After learning about the steps in the engineering design process, the First Graders at All Saints identified real problems that they have at home, school or in the community and brainstormed possible ideas and solutions to the problem. Prototypes of the inventions were shared with parents during an Open Science Morning. The event included a presentation from each group describing the problem identified, as well as the invention designed to solve the problem. Problems identified included ways to clean up messes, avoid traffic, protect animals, and combat littering. Open Science Morning provides opportunities for students to be inquirers, thinkers, risk-takers and communicators.



Celebrating Culture & Diversity




Grade 5 French students were excited to learn about Carnaval traditions throughout the French-speaking world and create their very own Carnaval floats. As part of the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme Transdisciplinary theme of "How we express ourselves," the students learned how, "culture is represented by symbols and celebrations that express diversity within our global community." The students focused on the commonalities as well as the different ways of celebrating this holiday time throughout the French-speaking world.

From Nice to Martinique to Quebec, the students brought the traditions to life through song, dance, stories, role-play, and art. At the conclusion of this celebration, the students created floats that represented which celebration resonated most with them or how they would celebrate this type of festival. From this study and engagement, the students have experienced and grown in the "inquiry into the ways in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values."



Linear Function



IB LEARNER PROFILE TRAITS







Students in Grade 8 have been putting their linear function skills to work as they try to graphically identify the temperature zones in which they would most like to live. After studying linear equations, linear inequalities, and systems of equations and inequalities, students sought to define the relationship between latitude and temperature as well as the relationship between altitude and temperature using linear models. Students graphed their results in two separate scatter plots and, using linear regression, established a line of best fit for each scatter plot. Then, they tested their lines for accuracy by plugging in a city that was not on their list.

Assessment projects like this one are a valuable aspect of the IB philosophy, as they demonstrate how students might use their skills in the future. While tests can evaluate a student's ability to perform an isolated skill, we are very rarely asked to complete testlike tasks in our adult lives. More often, we are asked to examine situations and evaluate how we might solve particular dilemmas using the skills, knowledge, and logic we possess. Often, in our careers, we are also asked to communicate these situations and their solutions through meetings and presentations. A project like the one described here asks students to call on a variety of skills (in both algebra and other areas) and teaches them to segment their workload, reflect on the accuracy of their work, and present their work in a formal manner. Students will be evaluated on IB Criteria D: Applying mathematics in real-life contexts, which encapsulates the NCTM and common core process standards of problem solving, reasoning and proof, communication, and representation.




